Time-loops: Movies Discussion

I recently came across an interesting movie called **ARQ** (see: <u>https://www.imdb.com/title/tt5640450/</u>) that reminded me of a time-loop episode in **X-Files**, as well as in other movies (**Edge of Tomorrow** – with Tom Cruise) and various other TV programs (including various **Star-Trek** series' episodes).

The basic premise of a time-loop is that the persons involved are reliving a period of time that may last, say an hour or so – or an entire day (or more). They are basically 'stuck' in that loop, experiencing events as if running against a stopwatch or an hourglass, and when the 'sand' runs out – they instantly restart at the beginning of the loop. Usually, they don't even realize (at least at first) that they are in that loop.

At some point, someone – sometimes it's only one person and sometimes others – 'join in' and discover that something is wrong with that moment in their life, that they are repeating crucial events again and again. Due to some random factor, or free choice – one or two aspects of the person's experience within the time-frame changes or is changed by the person, and the loop is either broken, or slightly modified – until the time runs out, and the person starts from scratch again – though with new knowledge or with a slight modification in the setting or circumstances.

ARQ (2016) is a fairly serious take on that, with the main character trying to survive a terrorist invasion into his home. They want to steal his "ARQ" invention that produces infinite energy – and that also seems to be affecting the time-stream, causing the time-loop.



Edge of Tomorrow (2014) is another serious time loop story, where the main character is fighting off an Alien invasion. The movie's ad poster has "Live. Die. Repeat" as the plotline's motto.




In addition to **ARQ**, I also saw another time-loop movie recently, called **Boss Level** (2020). This one has some humour in it. The main character constantly wakes up the day of his own murder/assassination and attempts to unlock the mystery behind his own untimely demise.

What makes the stories unbelievable (in both sense of the word), is how the person reliving the time-loop period keeps trying different timing, different activities, and choices, to 'beat the odds' and survive. Every time he reboots to the beginning of the loop, he has gained some knowledge and experience from the previous 'lifetime-loops' and figures out new ways to reach some otherwise unattainable goal. In many ways, these stories are like a video game, where you keep fighting until you either win or 'die' but can then reboot and start all over again – but in the next round, with enhanced knowledge of 'what not to do', as well as what to try, to go to the next level.

On the subject of a similarity with video games, there is the movie *Free Guy* (2021), where the main videogame character 'wakes up' after repeating a typical day, wearing the same suit, entering the bank where he works, greeting his friend the security guard with the exact same dialogue and greeting, etc., ... until one day he 'wakes up' and starts making his own decisions, etc.

As for the 3 films mentioned her (*ARQ, Boss,* and *Edge*), I enjoyed all three, as well as *Free Guy*, with *ARQ* topping the list. This is because in *ARQ*, more than one person becomes aware of the loop, including [**SPOILER ALERT**] – eventually – the bad guy, thus greatly reducing the probability of his survival.

Interestingly enough, the time-loop concept seems to be quite a popular theme in SF, and over 70 (listed) films have been produced since 1969, using time-loops as a basis for the plot. See: <u>https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/List_of_films_featuring_time_loops</u>.
