You'd Better Watch Out... Bob Jennings

SANTA CLAUS, one of the most enduring fantasy figures of all time makes his traditional appearance on December 24th every year. To quote directly from his Wikipediae entry:

Santa Claus, also known as Father Christmas, Saint Nicholas, Saint Nick, Kris Kringle, or simply Santa, is a legendary character originating in Western Christian culture, who is said to bring children gifts during the late evening and overnight hours on Christmas Eve of toys and candy or coal or nothing, depending on whether they are "naughty of nice". He supposedly accomplishes this with the aid of Christmas elves, who make the toys in his workshop, often said to be at the North Pole, and flying reindeer who pull his sleigh through the air. The modern character of Santa is based on folklore traditions surrounding Saint Nicholas, the English figure of Father Christmas and the Dutch figure of Sinterklass.

Santa is generally depicted as a portly, jolly, whitebearded man, often with spectacle, wearing a red coat with white fur collar and cuffs, white-furcuffed red trousers, red hat with white fur, and black leather belt and boots, carrying a bag full of gifts for children. He is commonly portrayed as laughing in a way that sounds like "ho ho ho". This image became popular in the United States and Canada in the 19th century due to the significant influence of the 1823 poem "A Visit From St. Nicholas". Caricaturist and political cartoonist Thomas Nast also played a role in the creation of Santa's image. This image has been maintained and reinforced through song, radio, television, children's books, family Christmas traditions, films, and advertising.

So powerful is this image of holiday good will and gift giving to children that it has been adopted into other cultures that have no long-standing Christian traditions to support it, including Japan and Korea, where it is seen as an opportunity to have a family holiday and give sweets and gifts to children.

In addition to the zillions of stories about him that have appeared in prose, verse, visual and audio media of all kinds, the character has been the subject of serious scientific studies including weighty examinations of the potential psychological effects Santa Claus can have on young children happily accepting everything they hear about him as factual.

Despite being relentlessly commercialized, the traditional image of Santa retains his appeal, easily overcoming critics, cynics, disbelievers, and would-be distracters. Grumps and Scrooges are no match for the venerable legend who embodies the very spirit of good will and happiness.

Santa Claus has been an icon of western civilization for centuries, but it is also clear that the need for a holiday of thanksgiving and gift giving in the midst of winter, a holiday positioned at or just after the Winter Solstice, is a long-standing tradition in most human cultures. The worst of winter might be still ahead, but the sun is returning and we, our families, our friends, and our neighbors will manage to survive. And Santa Claus is just the latest incarnation of this universal spirit of hope and thanksgiving.

Bob Jennings has been involved in fandom since the late 1950s, and is one of the original founding members of comics fandom, founding the SFPA and publishing hundreds of fanzines. From 1979 to 2000, Bob ran a science fiction/comics/game store, which is now all mail order. He's currently at work to develop a device that will zap robo-callers and internet spammers.

• Attico, Derek Tyler. The Autobiography of Benjamin Sisko [Star Trek]. Titan, 23.99 tp.

Benjamin Sisko tells the story of his career in Starfleet, and his life as a father and Bajor's Emmissary of the Prophets. Charting his rise through the ranks, his pioneering work designing the Defiant-class, his critical role as ambassador and leader during the Dominion War, and his sacred standing as a religious leader of his adopted home.

• Balle, Solvej. On the Calculation of Volume (Book I). New Directions, 23.95 tp.

Tara Selter has involuntarily stepped off the train of time. In her world, November 18th repeats itself endlessly. We meet Tara on her 122nd November 18th. She no longer experiences the changes of days, weeks, months, or seasons. She finds herself in a lonely new reality without being able to explain why. How is it that she wakes every morning into the same day, knowing to the exact second when the blackbird will burst into song and when the rain will begin?

• Balle, Solvej. On the Calculation of Volume (Book II). New Directions, 23.95 tp.

The first year of November 18th is coming to a close, and Tara Selter has returned to her hotel room in Paris, the place where it all began. As if perched at the edge of a precipice, she readies herself to leap into November 19th.

• Barsukov, Yaroslav. Sleeping Worlds Have No Memory. CAEZIK, 25.99 tp.

Refusing the queen's order to gas a crowd of protesters, Minister Shea Ashcroft is banished to the border to oversee the construction of the biggest defensive tower in history. However, the use of advanced technology taken from refugees makes the tower volatile and dangerous, becoming a threat to local interests. Shea has no choice but to fight the local hierarchy to ensure the construction succeeds-and to reclaim his own life.

• Bennett, Robert Jackson. The Tainted Cup [Shadow of the Leviathan #1]. Del Rey, 38.99 hc.

In Daretana's greatest mansion, a high imperial officer lies dead - killed, to all appearances, when a tree erupted from his body. • Bond, Charlotte. The Bloodless Princes [Fireborne Blade #2]. Tor.com, 27.99 hc.

Cursed by the previous High Mage, and following an - incident - with a supremely powerful dragon, newly-promoted High Mage Saralene visits the afterlife with a boon to beg of the Bloodless Princes who run the underworld. But Saralene and her most trusted advisor/champion/companion, Sir Maddileh, will soon discover that there's only so much research to be done by studying the old tales. Saralene will need more than just her wits to leave the underworld alive. And Maddileh will need more than just her Fireborne Blade.

• Boop, David (ed). Last Train Outta Kepler-283C. Baen, 25.00 tp.

David Boop's third space western anthology, consisting of 13 stories in all, features Sharon Lee & Steve Miller, Mark L. Van Name, Chesya Burke, Kevin Ikenberry, David Mack, John Stith, and more!

• Britain, Kristen. Spirit of the Wood [Green Rider]. Daw, 24.95 tp.

208 pages. When Lieutenant-Rider Laren Mapstone is made mentor to Tavin Bankside, a Green Rider trainee on his first message errand, her cold and brooding exterior quickly earns her the moniker the "Ice Lady." But after Laren is severely

wounded, the walls fall and Tavin's natural empathic gift leaves him vulnerable to the assault of the lieutenant's emotions. Tavin must save Lieutenant Mapstone's life and master his own empathic gift before it destroys them both.

• Broadbent, Carissa. The Songbird & The Heart of Stone [Crowns of Nyaxia #3]. Bramble, 39.99 hc.

Mische and Asar must travel the treacherous path to the underworld, facing trials, beasts, and the vengeful ghosts of their pasts. Yet, most dangerous of all is the alluring call of the darkness - and her forbidden attraction to Asar, a burgeoning bond that risks invoking the wrath of gods. As her betrayal looms, the underworld closes in and angry gods are growing restless. Mische will be forced to choose between the redemption of the sun or the damnation of the darkness.

• Burke, Sue. Usurpation [Semiosis #3]. Tor, 38.99 hc.

Stevland, the dominant sentient lifeform of Pax, has clandestinely sent some of its progeny to Earth. To explore, to spread, to report back. Since their germination, Earth has been a powder keg. Human rebellion, robot uprisings, and global pandemics have created chaos, distrust, and deaths. Let alone one involving ancient Echo lords who can turn layers of reality into a gameboard with human lives for pieces.

• Correia, Larry. Graveyard of Demons [Saga of the Forgotten War #5]. Baen, 37.00 hc.

Following the directions of a demon with whom Vokkan made a pact, Vokkan travels to seek the treasure he most desires: immortality. None stand in his way - or so he thinks. But Ashok Vadal is not dead. The shard of the Black Sword embedded in his heart - the sword that called him to wield it - is not done with Vadal yet. Now, wielding another Black Sword, Vadal sets out to rescue the prophetess Thera Vane, find the Sons of the Black Sword, defeat the wicked Capitol and throw down the Law forever, bringing for the first time, freedom to all the people of Lok.

• Dewes, J. S. *The Relentless Legion* [*Divide* #3]. Tor, 26.99 tp.

The Sentinels have rallied under the leadership of Adequin Rake, and Cavalon Mercer has uncovered the horrifying genetic solution his grandfather is about to unleash on the unsuspecting outer colonies. Both Rake and Cavalon race against time to save the universe once again. They'll need every resource, every ally who might answer the call. It might not be enough.

• Dinsdale, Robert. Once a Monster: a Reimagining of the Legend of the Minotaur. Pan, 21.99 tp.

London, 1861. Ten-year-old Nell belongs to a crew of mudlarks who work a stretch of the Thames along the Ratcliffe Highway dredging up coals, copper and pieces of iron spilled by the river barges - searching for treasure in the mud in order to appease her master, Benjamin Murdstone. But one day, Nell discovers a body on the shore. He's nearly seven feet tall, with matted hair covering his legs, and on his head are the suggestion of horns.

• Drakeford, Scott. The Fate of Silent Gods [Age of Ire #2]. Tor, 39.99 hc.

Unsure of who he can trust, even among his own people, Emrael must find a way to score a major victory against both the forces of the dark lord and the corrupt lords of the provinces. The soldiers of the 11th Bretton Infantry knew they were being dropped into a combat zone on Dharien. But they didn't know just how bad things really were, with the entire planet about to fall to the rebel Flags. The orders from the Highest are clear: make their way to Tabuk and keep the city under the banner of the Hegemony. For Mason Tellec, it's one more combat mission - with a difference. • Glover, Nicole. The Improvisers [Murder and Magic standalone]. Voyager, 24.99 tp.

1930s America. Velma Frye is many things. A pilot, a former bootlegger, a well-seasoned traveler, a jazz pianist...and a wielder of celestial magic. She's also a member of the mystical Rhodes family as well as an investigator for arcane oddities for a magic rights organization, dealing with both simple and complicated cases. And when a pocket watch instigates a magical brawl after one of her flight shows, things become very complicated.

• Green, Ian. Extremophile. AdAstra, 39.99 hc.

Charlie and Parker are punks by night, biohackers by day, living in the stuttering decay of near-future climate-collapse London. When a group of extremist Green activists hire them for a series of jobs ranging from robbery to murder, they enter an escalating biological arms race against faceless corporations, amoral biohackers, and criminal cyberpunks.

• Guanzon, Thea. The Hurricane Wars. Voyager, 24.99 tp.

The heart is a battlefield. All Talasyn has ever known is the Hurricane Wars. Growing up an orphan in a nation under siege by the ruthless Night Emperor, she found her family among the soldiers who fight for freedom. But she is hiding a deadly secret. Light magic courses through her veins, a blazing power believed to have been wiped out years ago that can cut through the Night Empire's shadows.

• Hackwith, A. J. Toto. Ace, 25.99 tp.

I was mostly a Good Dog until they sold me out to animal control, okay? But if it's a choice between Oz, with its creepy little singing dudes, and being behind bars in gray old Kansas, I'll choose the place where animals talk and run the show for now, thanks. It's not my fault that the kid is stuck here too, or that she stumbled into a tug-of-war over a pair of slippers that don't even taste good. Now one witch in good eyeliner calls her pretty and we're off on a quest? Teenagers.

• Hair, David. The Burning Land [The Talmont Trilogy #1]. Mobius, 23.99 tp.

The Falcons are knights of the Vestal Order, pledged to use their powers to protect the Empire of Talmont from the cruel Vyr and the carnage they have unleashed upon the world. When the Falcons take a Vyr alive, they go against the protocols of the Vestal Order and interrogate him. They are horrified to learn, if the Vyr speaks truly, that the Empire's worst enemy may not be the Vyr - but the Vestal Order itself.

• Hallahan, Katie. The Twice-Sold Soul [The McKenna Ellerbeck Series #1]. Orbit, 25.99 tp.

You can't outrun your demons - McKenna Ellerbeck knows this all too well. She's been running from literal demons for a decade, one that will stop at nothing to take McKenna's magic for their own and one that shattered her heart by grasping for dark power. McKenna is ready to hide again when she's confronted by her ex, the Archdemon of Desire Remiel Blake. Remi calls in an old debt -- all McKenna must do to repay it is return to her hometown of Arcadia Commons, Massachusetts, for seven days.

• Hawley, Sarah. Servant of Earth [The Shards of Magic #1]. Ace, 39.00 hc.

Kenna Heron is best known in her village for being a little wild - some say half feral - but she'll need every ounce of that ferocity to survive captivity in the cruel Fae court. Trapped as a servant in the faeries' underground kingdom of Mistei, Kenna must help her new mistress undertake six deadly trials, one for each branch of magic.

• Hopkinson, Nalo. Jamaica Ginger and Other Concoctions. Tachyon, 21.95 tp.

Book launch at White Dwarf Books Nov 5, 2024. This is a new collection of short fiction, her first since 2015, from Caribbean-Canadian author Nalo Hopkinson: a woman and her cyborg pig eke a living in a future waterworld; two scientists contemplate the cavernous remains of an alien lifeform; and an artist creates nanotechnology that asserts Blackness where it is least welcome.

• Jensen, Danielle L. The Traitor Queen [The Bridge Kingdom #2]. Del Rey, 24.95 tp.

Risking her life on the Tempest Seas, Lara returns to Ithicana with a plan not only to free its king but to liberate the Bridge Kingdom from her father's clutches, using his own weapons: the sisters whose lives she spared. Yet not only is the palace inescapable, there are more players in the game than Lara ever realized. Enemies and allies switching sides in the fight for crowns, kingdoms, and bridges. But her greatest adversary of all might be the man she's trying to free - the husband she betrayed.

• Kawaguchi, Toshikazu. *Before We Forget Kindness* [*Before the Coffee Gets Cold* #5]. Hanover Square, 26.99 hc.

The mysterious cafe where customers arrive hoping to travel back in time welcomes four new guests. The father who could not allow his daughter to get married. A woman who couldn't give Valentine's Day chocolates to her loved one. A boy who wants to show his smile to his divorced parents. A wife holding a child with no name. They must follow the cafe's strict rules, however, and come back to the present before their coffee goes cold.

• Koja, Kathe. Catherine the Ghost. CLASH, 25.95 tp.

Cathy Earnshaw. Catherine Linton. Mother. Daughter. They never saw each other alive. In Catherine the Ghost these two young women confront loss, captivity, and the dark edge of eternity itself, to claim their full existence and share their power.

• Kristjansson, Snorri. The Silent Emperor [The Hidden Legion #2]. Solaris, 22.99 tp.

Beaten and bloodied, down two of their number after the fray in Alexandria, Aemilius and his new comrades of the Hidden Legion make their way back to the Fort, the Legion's mysterious headquarters and seat of power, where they receive new information and a new mission: to infiltrate the mansion of a powerful senator and foil a plot to poison him. A

wild chase ensues, from the shores of Greece to the frozen plains of Germania, as the Legion tracks down an enemy who mocks them at every turn...

• Lakshminarayan, Lavanya. Interstellar Megachef [Flavour Hacker #1]. Solaris, 22.99 tp.

Stepping off a long-haul star freighter from Earth, Saras Kaveri has one bag of clothes, her little flying robot Kili... and an invitation to compete in the galaxy's most watched, most prestigious cooking show. Because the king is the last of his line, and the specter of his twenty-first birthday and the full force of his curse approaches. But there's only one way to save a dying king - and it lies with the one person who is hiding the biggest secret of all. Cerise.

• Lares, Mariely. Sun of Blood and Ruin. Voyager, 23.99 tp.

Having been saved from execution at the hands of the Draoihn - powerful magic users Raine used to count as allies -Raine finds herself in the Fault, a vast magical wasteland, which is falling apart before her eyes. She's fought who deserved it (and sometimes those who didn't). And she's never looked back. Gilgamesh, Mozart, and Bram Stoker Walk Into a Bar in Westeros...

"Gilgamesh and Enkidu at Uruk." ~ Jean-Luc Picard

There's an episode of *Star Trek: The Next Generation* — "Darmok", the second episode of the fifth season, for those keeping track — wherein Captain Picard realizes that the alien he's met (Dathon, played by Paul Winfield) speaks only in metaphor, thus prompting him to try to relate using events from Earth's history. *The Epic of Gilgamesh* has been part of the human lexicon for thousands of years, and *of course* Picard is as familiar with that story as he is with the works of Shakespeare. Using the friendship of Gilgamesh and Enkidu as his example, Picard manages to bridge the communications gap with Dathon before the Tamarian dies.

Being a relic of the Babylonian Era, *The Epic of Gilgamesh* has been translated and re-told countless times, mainly based off a copy that was discovered in Nineveh in 1853. I've even got a copy of the book by Robert Silverberg in my library. It's not a new story, and one could be forgiven for thinking that there's nothing more to the story than what we've had for however many years, right? I mean, it's always existed in fragments of stone tablets and such since the 18th century BC (that's Before Christ for those of you in Berkeley), and there's been a possibility of finding more.

Well, there's now more to the story.

In September 2024, the Sulaymaniyah Museum in the Kurdistan region of Iraq announced the discovery of a tablet that had been recovered after the fall of Baghdad in 2003. The museum paid smugglers and other scoundrel types to make sure that historical and cultural artifacts wouldn't leave the country in spite of the massive amounts of looting that came with the downfall of Saddam Hussein. One of those artifacts was a tablet with additional lines from Chapter Five of the tale. This new fragment adds to the story of Gilgamesh and Enkidu killing Humbaba, along with the two meeting a monkey.

So, score one for the Babylonians. They've published a new piece of the story before George R. R. Martin has.

Also in September, researchers at the Leipzig Municipal Libraries were compiling a new edition of the *Köchel* catalog, a comprehensive archive of work by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. Hidden amongst the material was a previously unknown composition, *Serenade in C*, a 12-minute string trio written for two violins and a bass. Researchers believe Mozart might have been around twelve years old when he wrote it, although the manuscript is not in his hand. This may be a copy that was made around 1780.

Ulrich Leisinger, head of research at the International Mozarteum Foundation, says the manuscript is stylistically consistent with his work between the ages of ten and thirteen years of age. "It looks as if—thanks to a series of favorable circumstances—a complete string trio has survived in Leipzig," Leisinger adds. "The source was evidently Mozart's sister, and so it is tempting to think that she preserved the work as a memento of her brother. Perhaps he wrote the trio specially for her." With its entry into the catalog, the piece has been renamed *Eine Ganz kleine Nachtmusik* and was performed in Salzburg, Austria on September 19.

Score one for the musical prodigy, who has a new piece for us to enjoy before George R. R. Martin has.

Not to be outdone, Bram Stoker also has made the news with a discovery in a Dublin library archive.

Brian Cleary was browsing through a Christmas supplement of the Dublin edition of the *Daily Mail* from 1890 when he stumbled across "Gibbet Hill," a previously undocumented piece from the writer of *Dracula*. The short story has never been referenced in any Stoker bibliography, remaining hidden for over 130 years.

"I read *Dracula* as a child and it stuck with me, I read everything from and about Stoker that I could get my hands on," said Cleary. He was visiting the National Library of Ireland while on leave to retrain his hearing after cochlear implant surgery. "I sat in the library flabbergasted, that I was looking at potentially a lost ghost story from Stoker, especially one from around the time he was writing *Dracula*, with elements of *Dracula* in it," said Cleary. "I sat looking at the screen wondering, am I the only living person who had read it? Followed by, what on earth do I do with it?"

Cleary consulter Stoker biographer Paul Murray, who confirmed that the story was previously unknown. It's a story about a sailor murdered by three criminals, whose bodies were hanged on a gibbet (gallows) as a warning to travelers. Murray says, "It's a classic Stoker story, the struggle between good and evil, evil which crops up in exotic and unexplained ways, and is a way station on his route to publishing *Dracula*."

So, after 130 years, Bram Stoker has given the world a new story before George R. R. Martin has.

So that's three brand new (new to us, anyway) stories from dead people. Oh, and let's not forget that Brandon Sanderson wrote *five* novels during the pandemic lockdown, too. *And* there's now a brand new edition of *Heavy Metal* coming back into the world.

What's Martin's excuse?

The Week's Brendan Morrow has a nicely organized timeline of the epic tale of the Story That Refuses To Be Written. Read it here: https://theweek.com/feature/briefing/1022767/a-complete-timeline-of-george-rr-martins-progress-on-the-winds-of-winter

Starting in June 2010, when Martin announced that he had four completed chapters, the timeline reads like a "Will they or won't they?" dance of anticipation and disappointment as Martin continuously makes promises, teasing progress, but then failing to deliver time and again. Throughout the process, Martin *insists* that this book in his priority, only to be sidetracked by *Fire & Blood* and HBO's spinoff series *House of the Dragon*. In fact, all of the various spinoff productions take up a good chunk of time, plus there are the other stories he has to write in order to meet certain other obligations and such and thus and so....

So a book that was originally planned for a 2014 release now sits in abeyance ten years later, two years after Martin says it was "three-quarters of the way done" during a Penguin Random House Q&A session.

And now, here we are a month after Martin posted on his blog, that he's *still* not done — but he's made progress! He's added pages to both *The Winds of Winter* and *Blood & Fire*, which is the second book informing *HOTD*. He's also got another Dunk & Egg story to write. And once *Winds* is (finally) published(?), he still has *A Dream of Spring* to write for the main series. Is *Dream* the final book in the series? Will he even get to that one? Or will he once again deliver excuse after excuse, to the consternation of those fans who have persevered and stuck it out to the very last?

To be sure, Martin's not the only author who's failed to deliver the next book in a series — looking at you, David Gerrold — but right now, he's the most visible and well-known. And he's still alive, which kind of but not really gives him a leg up on Bram Stoker and Mozart, but then again... And no, he doesn't *owe* you a scrap or shred of any new story at all. Except for the fact that he continues to say he's working on it. He continues to promise delivery and scold you for being impatient when he doesn't live up to his word. And he continues to demonstrate that he's a man without integrity.

(But at least he's not trying to fleece you out of more money to pay for the thing he's not delivering, right, Alec?)


