Introduction

A Short History of "The Kerosene Papers"

The unusual discoveries of fragments of what appear to be a biographical index for an apparent biography titled "Cow Is Giving Kerosene" began to occur slightly prior to 2008. The first of these, covering partial entries for S-Z was, to quote the introduction to the page in BEAM #1, "found between pages 101 and 102 of a 1970 edition of 'The Atrocity Exhibition' in Foozles Book Outlet, Pigeon Forge, TN, presumably having been used as a bookmark." The find was implied to be attributed to Nic Farey, a notoriously unreliable narrator.

2008 itself brought a further find, a literal "message in a bottle" - in this case an empty Jim Beam fifth in the penthouse suite of the Plaza Hotel, Las Vegas, in circumstances described at the time by the much more reliable Mark Plummer as "shortly after the hotel had been occupied by a conference of lawnmower salesmen and before the building was abandoned after an unexplained chemical accident", covering D-G. The proximity of that year's Corflu to this discovery may or may not be related, yet this version suggests a British edition of the presumed full volume entitled "Cow is Giving Paraffin".

These documents created an immediate but short-lived interest in what became known as "Kerosenology" (see Preface). However, no further whole pages were unearthed until 2016 when a fan driving to MAC2 (74th World Science Fiction Convention) was surreptitiously gifted with entries for A-B, the circumstances related by Plummer as follows: "(The fan) emerged from a gas station restroom in Topeka, KS to find an obviously aged and partially torn page tucked under the driver's side windshield wiper underneath flyers for a local pizza delivery, a car detailing advertisement and a business card for a local gay escort service. Almost immediately recognising its significance, but wishing to remain nameless for fear of reprisals, the fan arranged for the manuscript – which was heavily stained with what appears to be pickling vinegar – to be left in the back of Nic Farey's Las Vegas taxi. An accompanying note, written on the back of a flyer advertising The Distinguished Wakamba Cocktail Lounge of New York City, explained how it had come to light and begged the finder to bring it to the attention of the wider science fiction community."

The pages noted above are transcribed within, reorganized, we hope usefully, into alphabetical order.

There have, whether surprisingly or not, been occasional additional finds as well as further reconstruction of obscured or partial entries from the known pages so far. New annotations and some analysis points have also been added for this collection.

We are not presenting this slim volume as a reference work as such, but given recent if highly sporadic addenda to the canon, it may be considered slightly useful, perhaps even mildly entertaining.

Preface

Kerosenology

As noted in the introduction, the original "Kerosene" discoveries inspired a certain amount of conjecture and even some academic interest, albeit at a very niche level.

Very occasionally the topic reappears, usually as an exercise in nostalgia, but often as mockery of fannish fads of bygone days when All Fandom was truly Plunged Into War for a week or two, although that doesn't apply so much in the case of Kerosenology, which always was (and remains) a very minority interest.

As Plummer wrote upon the publication of the A-B fragment: "...its authorship and primary subject matter became a matter of furious debate in academic literary – and, oddly, naval architecture and marine engineering – circles. In 'Fool as Fuel: cognition, estrangement and the Kerosene Conundrum' ('Extrapolation', v51#3), the critic Cosmo McKittrick presented a detailed semantic analysis proving that authorship lay with one, all or none of Bengo Mistral, Margaret Atwood and Graham Charnock, or perhaps somebody else entirely, sparking several supporting and refuting articles across multiple issues of 'Vector', 'Foundation' and 'Golfing Today'.

"But interest in the topic soon faded. In 2015 the 'Journey Planet' team attempted to revisit the controversy with a theme issue guest edited by Colin Harris, Helen Montgomery and James Bacon's moustache, but it was impounded by the Royal College of Nursing under the Dangerous Dogs Act 1991 and never distributed. Of late, new theories have largely been confined to obscure Kerosenologist websites, most of which are hosted in Azerbaijan".

Despite the source material's general dismissal as being both trivial, unimportant but mostly unreliable, interest in Kerosenology has proved remarkably persistent, albeit among a very few practitioners. The seemingly global affection for conspiracy theories undoubtedly plays into the dedication and enthusiasm shown by devotees here.

As is so often the case with contentious or even (perhaps especially) trivial topics, opponents and would-be debunkers of Kerosenology are in some cases equally vehement. The introduction notes the apparent reluctance of the discoverers of the source material to publicly identify themselves, and have typically requested anonymity, if not actual witness protection. Despite reasonable evidence that the documents <u>do</u> exist, anecdotally provided by some detailed description of scribbles and stains thereon, no actual images of these pages have been made available - those purporting to be such on the Azerbaijani websites are all in fact theoretical reconstructions.

Another assertion is that more recent claimed discoveries (see Foreword) are forgeries, an attempt by some Kerosenologists to retain or even revive interest in the subject, even as some of their own number have cast doubt upon the authenticity of the newer material. The Compilers make no judgement on the veracity of either of these claims; readers and students can draw their own conclusions.

In fairness, we do point out that skeptics paint all "Kerosene" discoveries with the same broad brush, contending that the whole thing was made up to start with.

Foreword

New Discoveries

There have been four sources for additions to the material:

1) Forensic analysis of the primary sources.

The original documents have inevitably been described in a manner suggesting age and degradation, variously torn, stained and written upon. Those who claim to have access to these originals have used increasingly sophisticated methods not available at the time of discovery in attempts at reconstruction.

2) The "Belfast Trove"

For a few months at the end of 2022 and the beginning of 2023 it is now claimed that individual entries were contained in fortune cookies from the Sum Ting Wong Chinese takeaway in West Belfast. The recipient (who, as usual, has requested anonymity) stated that they did not initially realize the relevance of the seemingly incomprehensible "fortunes" and so at first discarded them. Thus, the earliest ones are recreated here from the finder's memory alone and should probably be considered less reliable. Given the substantial difference between this method of discovery and previous finds, it isn't surprising that the "Belfast Trove" has been most subject to accusations of forgery and fannish hoax.

3) P-Q

An envelope purported to have been received by a local fan near Chengdu, China in late September of 2023, the contents of which were transcribed (into both Mandarin and English) and distributed, although not widely. The source, rather unhelpfully, merely described the envelope itself as "postmarked Wales".

4) List of Appendices

A reported flypost on the El Malecón beach promenade in Puerto Vallarta, Jalisco with the Spanish title "La vaca está dando queroseno: apéndices", although the listing below the title was in English. Partially torn and weathered, this was photographed by an alert tourist before its removal.

Contrarian arguments inevitably exist, the most persuasive being that the actual biographical subject would either (a) not be mentioned at all in the index since their inclusion would be implied on all pages, or (b) if they were the subject, these entries might be expected to be much lengthier. A crucial sticking point is the lack of a "trouser press" cross-reference here, though see note on APPENDIX VI. The provenance of the D-G section, however, is generally considered the most "reliable" of the finds, having been related by Plummer.

²⁷Although "trouser press" has a page reference (see Note 4) there is no specific entry for it. The alleged original is torn, but the spacing suggests the title quoted here. The five pages referred to (204-9) suggest an event of relative importance, but apparently not so much that it is mentioned again anywhere else. Accounts of what may have transpired during a known "trouser press incident" from 2003 are available elsewhere. It is possible that this may refer to a different trouser press entirely, though perhaps not likely.
